THE LEGENDS OF THE GAME

Mays High School Basketball

In the 1950's and 1960's, The Mays High School basketball program was one of the elite programs in the single A division of District 3. The program was started in the 1953-54 season by B.E. Mays' first principle and coach, Edward (Wes) Brown. Also assisting with the coaching duties that year was coach "Red" Dawkins.

The first co-captains of the girl's team were Ida B. Wilkins and Poniese Makupson with Wendell Brown and Robert Durrah serving as co-captains of the boy's team.

B.E. Mays Girls Basketball

The 1953-54 basketball season was highlighted by the sparkling play of seniors Ida B. Wilkins, Carlotta Arthur and Poniese Makupson. The years 1955 through 1957, the team was led by the offensive play of Zonnie Wilkins and the defense was led by of Millie Russell.

In 1957-1958 the team was led by their star guard and captain Mamie Littlejohn. The offense was led by Ida B Johnson. The year 1959 saw the emergence of Annie "Slim" Jeter who was of one the top players in the conference. During the years of 1960 through 1961, the girl's team was led by Mamie Johnson, one of the top scorers in the school's history and "Sis" Curry who was the top defensive player in the conference.

The 1961-1962 team included the superb play of star guard and Co-captain Minnie Logan and the timely offensive playmaking of Carolyn Sue Dawkins. The 1963-64 team was led by All-Conference forward Brenda Kay Smith and the tenacious defense of Levator Logan and Zera Teamer. Pearl Smith showed her versatility as she played both the guard and forward positions.

In the 1964-65 season, the girl's team was led by co-captains Sandra Franks and Myrtle Wannamaker and the defensive play of Patricia Williams.

B. E. Mays Boys Basketball

Wendell Brown and Robert Durrah were the stars of the 1953-54 inaugural season. From 1955-1958, Little Ted Dover, Eddie Dean Oglesby, Boyce Durrah and Willie Whittenburg led the Panthers to winning seasons. The tandem of Jackie Dover and Rochelle Oglesby led the team to a winning season in 1958-59. In the 1959-60 season, the Panthers were led by co-captains Maxie Dover and Nathaniel "Skebo" Gist.

The 1961-62 team consisted of Clarence and Douglas Brackett, Coleman Dean Dawkins, Steady Carpenter and Marvin Simpson. That team was considered by many to be the most complete and most athletic team ever produced at Mays. Clarence Brackett set most of the school's scoring records that year while Coleman Dawkins, Douglas Brackett and Steady Carpenter made it difficult for the opposition to score in the paint.

In the 1963 and 64 seasons, the Panthers were led by co-captains Dennis McCollum and Gary "Monk" Russell with a supporting cast that included Sterling McCollum and Curtis Byrd. This team was runner-up in the Single A conference championship. The 1964-65 team was led by the triple threat of Sleeter Dover, Jimmy Gaffney and Quinion Dover.



While walking down main street I ran into Albert Jeter; he looked quite distinguished in his police uniform. I resumed my trip to Florida. Upon my arrival in Miami I met Zera Teamer, Secretary to the Major, Bobby Hymes. Scientists there had perfected space travel to the point of exploring the moon at will. A celebration for Astronauts Jimmy Makupson and Paul Bates was in progress. Covering the event were reporters Modestine Dawkins and Pearl Smith. It was truly evident that the words of encouragement from our faculty during our high school days were well taken by every member of our class.

1969 CLASS HISTORY

On August 29, 1966, a group of thirty-eight ninth graders left their different homes and schools and came to Benjamin E. Mays Consolidated School to further their education

The group was greeted by a hand of welcome and placed under the guidance of Miss E.M. Lowman and Miss S.A. Wise. In a week or so they had been sectioned off. Many prepared themselves and participated in various activities and became active members of the student council.

We selected our officers: President; Larry Peeler, Vice-President; Mildred Murphy, Secretary; Cynthia Gaffney, Treasure; Mary Oglesby, Business Manager; Fred Curry, and Chaplain; Jesse Byrd, III.





Roy Logan was sworn in as the first African-American member of the Cowpens Town Council May, 2008.









