



Dr. Benjamin E. Mays delivered the graduation address at the 17th annual commencement exercises of the Benjamin E. Mays High School in Pacolet Mills Wednesday night.

# Horace Rice's Mother Has Reason To Be Proud

Sabra Rice of Pacolet never thought her son Horace would achieve as much as he has in the past 20 years. She certainly is proud of

Horace was born and grew up in Pacolet. He graduated from Benjamin E. Maye High School in 1956. He had no desire to altered

He went directly to work as a surgery

orderly at Spartanburg General Hospital. He worked one year, until he realized that he would have to go to coilege if he wanted to make the most of his abilities.

During that same year, Horace Rice also became increasingly active in his work at Gethsemane Baptist Church. He was elected Sunday School superintendent and later ordained a deacon.

He says, "I prayed to God to bless me with a full life - a life that would contribute to the advancement of other lives. My church work gave me confidence. I believed that God would bless me in my college en-

Rice was one of five children. His father Steve made ends meet by working as a carpenter's helper at the S.C. School for the Deaf and Blind at Cedar Spring. Ills mother remembers, "We were poor

and didn't have anything. I always wondered how Horace was going to do it when he talked about going to college. But he said there would be a way."

Rice applied and was accepted as a stu-dent at Johnson C. Smith University in Charlotte in August, 1981. He also was hired as an orthopedic attendant at Charlotte Memorial Hospital. Even he may not have fully realized it then, but he was on his way.

"With \$50 and a lot of faith in God, I packed my bags," he says.

When he arrived in Charlotte, the college

treasurer told him he could not register without the (then) full initial tuition payment of \$180.

"I demanded to see the college president," Rice says. "I informed him that I had only \$50 and needed that money for bus fare and meals at work until my first payday in two weeks. I promised to make all payments before the end of the school year."

The school's chief officer waived the ini-

tial payment and allowed Rice to pay his tuition in monthly installments

For the next four years the determined young man worked the 11 p m. 7 a.m. shift at the hospital, six days a week. "I got off work at 7 and rode the bus back to campus. At 7-30, I rushed to my dorm room and changed clothes. I went to breakfast at 7-45 and then to class at 8."

His last class ended at 3 p.m. He rushed to the library for an hour's study. He returned to his room at 4,30 and slept till his room-mate awakened him at 8,30. Then he dress ed for work, dropped by the library for another hour with his books and caught the bus for work at 10.

"I can remember taking 30-second naps standing on the elevator while traveling from the first to the top floor of the hespit ol," he recells.

Rice was tempted many times to chuck the whole thing and go home, but he held fast. He received his bachelor of arts degree in psychology and sociology in May, 1965. He accepted a job as guidance counselor for Virginia's Bedford County Schools He also enrolled in the master's program at the University of Virginia.

In 1957, he was called by the draft again. He had received three deferrals because of his schooling and job. He was inducted into the Army and trained as an armed reconnaisance scout. Rice was sent to Korea where he worked in the hostile fire zone of the DMZ (Demilitarized Zone)

He returned to his Bedford County jeb in 1999 and began to diversify his goals.

Rice earned his master's degree in 1973, he was ordained for the ministry and subsequently became pastor at New Green Mounfain Baptist Church in Esmont, Va. He also involved himself in numerous other religious, educational, civic and political efforts.





## Benjamin E. Mays honored at rededication

PACOLET hen Uzee Brown attended Benjamin E. Mays School in the late 1960s, he met a teacher who inspired him to pursue a career in

this was the first school to bear the Mays name.

Brown, who went on to earn a doctorate in music, returned to his alma mater Sunday afternoon to help rededicate the school in Mays' name.

More than 300 people showed up for the two-hour event which included an unveiling of a portrait of Mays, plaques with names of former students and faculty who attended the school during the 1950s, '60s and '70s.

At that time, the school was known as the Benjamin E. Mays School. That name was changed to the Middle School of Pacolet in the early '80s. Now it will be known as Middle School of Pacolet/Original Benjamin E.

A majority of the crowd at Sunday's dedication were former students, faculty and

Today just happens to be my birthday. And I can think of no better present than to see the name of Benjamin E. Mays nailed upon the walls of this school of which I am. proud to call my alma mater," said Brown during the ceremony in the school gym.

#### BENJAMIN E. MAYS

A look at some of the career accomplishments of Benjamin E. Mays:

From 1930 to 1932, he directed a study of black churches in the nation along with the Institute of Social and Religious Research in New York City. This led to the "The Negro's Church", published in ■ President of Morehouse College.

Following his presidency at Morehouse College in Atlanta he served as president of the Atlanta School Board for 12 years.

Mays was also a Baptist minister.

Brown, a music professor at Morehouse College in Atlanta, spoke in an almost sermon-like pattern, applauding the Pacolet community's recent push to get Mays name back on the school.

Brown, who met Mays on a few occasions and who also sang at his funeral, showed the sad expression on Mays' face once he found out in 1983 the school name would be changed.

He said that although Sunday's event was a great step in getting Mays name back on the building, it should be taken as just a first step in returning it to its original name.

Supporters of the school's renaming said they pushed to get the name back on the building because of Mays' importance and the legacy he left behind.

The Epworth native grew up a son of ex-slaves who could not read. He attended high school, college and he received a doctoral degree in 1935.

He served as an English instructor at South Carolina State College: executive secretary of the Tampa. Fla., Urban League and is bestknown for being one of the influ-

ences of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Mays delivered King's eulogy in 1968.

In his lifetime, Mays received 55 honorary degrees.

He also had

six academic buildings and a street in Atlanta named in his honor.

Pacolet Mills was the first place in the nation which honored Mays by naming its school after him.

Mays has also received the Order of the Palmetto, the highest citizen honor in the state.

He is a member of the state's Hall of Fame.

Mays died March 28, 1984, but Brown told the crowd "although the building's name has changed over the years his spirit has never left it halls."

## Mr. Edward West Brown

The late Mr. Edward West Brown was born on July 3, 1917 in Chester, SC. He was the son of the late Earnest and Annie Brown and husband of Mrs. Jessie Mae Brown. To this union was born one daughter, Audrey Grant; three grandchildren: Patrice, Veronica and Trevor, and one great-grandson, Scott, III.

Mr. Brown attended the public Schools of Chester County. In the pursuit of post-secondary education, he earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Social Studies and Physical Education from Benedict College, Columbia, SC and a Masters at North Carolina Central State University, Durham, NC. Credits for other studies were received at South Carolina State University, Orangeburg, SC..

Mr. Brown was Principal at Ralph J. Bunche Elementary School,, Cowpens, SC and transferred to Benjamin E. Mays Consolidated School, Pacolet Mills, SC in 1953. After leaving Mays he was principal at Green Pond High in NC for three years, head coach at Finley, and Assist. Principal at Lewisville High School in Richburg upon his retirement in 1985.

Mr. Brown was the first principal of Benjamin E. Mays and served in that capacity until 1963. He implemented and managed an efficient, as well as very effective, educational program. Therefore, the school graduated competitive students who faired well in post secondary schools and also in the work environment. Mr. Brown was very effective in utilizing his education, special communication and intepersonal skills in relating to and addressing the over-all individual needs of the students. He was held in very high regard and even served as a father figure for some.

The best interest of his students, faculty and the parents were always of utmost importance and at the forefront of his administration. He established a rapport with them on every level and could even address the parents by their first name. In working closely with the parents, in conjunction with the faculty and students, Mr. Brown served as an inspiration to all. He was an outstanding Principal, Basketball Coach and Mentor.

He was also a member of Pleasant View United Methodist Church; Superintendent of the Sunday School, Secretary of Pleasant View Building Fund, President of Methodist Men, an annual delegate to the SC Methodist Conference, Life Member of the SC Education Association, member of the Athletic Association of SC, Life Member of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, member of Fraternal Order of the Masons, and served in the United States Army from 1942 to 1946 with the Amphibian Outfit in the Pacific.

The Benjamin E. Mays Reunion Committee published a combined yearbook in celebration of the Benjamin E. Mays School Reunion in 1993. The yearbook was comprised of the school years 1953-54 - 1969-70 and dedicated it in memory of Mr. Brown.

The Benjamin E. Mays Renaming Committee, with heartfelt gratitude and utmost regard, elected posthumously, Mr. Edward West Brown as one of the educators to be honored at the Middle School of Pacolet (Original Benjamin E. Mays) Dedication Service on November 14, 1999.



## Mrs. Alberta Ruff Daniel

The late Mrs. Alberta Ruff Daniel was born in Newberry County and the oldest of 11 children. She moved at an early age to Union, South Carolina with her parents Seldon R. and Sarah Eigner Ruff and was the wife of the late Rev. J.S. Daniel.

She attended the public schools of Union and received a B.A. Degree in Education from Benedict College Further studies at South Carolina State College, Livingstone College, and Winston-Salem Teachers' College served to enhance the quality of her service to humanity.

For 37 years (as of 1964) she taught in the public schools of both North and South Carolina where she continuously devoted herself to the education of youth. Her constant effort was to have each student develop to his fullest potential. Her teaching career began initially in Woodruff, South Carolina where she taught for one year after graduating from Benedict. It continued in Kelton and Union, South Carolina of Union County until she was married and moved to North Carolina with her husband.

For 22 years she worked in the church as a minister's wife, first in East Spencer, North Carolina and later in Spartanburg, South Carolina at Majority Baptist Church. In her role as a pastor's wife, she organized both youth and adults in serving as pianist, choir director, Sunday School teacher, and Missionary. She was also instrumental in helping to raise funds to pay off the great debt that they found at Majority. Shortly after the burning of the mortgage, she began teaching private piano lessons. Later she returned to the classroom and began teaching at Maysville School in Pacolet Mills, South Carolina. When it closed, she was transferred to Benjamin E. Mays Consolidated School in Pacolet Mills where she taught and served as Assistant Principal of grades one through six. During these years she received numerous honors and awards.

After the death of her husband, she moved back to Union and continued teaching at Benjamin E. Mays until she retired in 1964. In addition, she rendered service to the Corinth Baptist Church of Union, South Carolina as Director of the Junior Choir, Sunday School Teacher, Pianist for the Missionary Circle #3, and member of the General Missionary. Other community activities included Pianist for the Minister' Wives'

Alliance of Union County, member of the State Minister' Wives' Alliance member of the South Carolina Educational Association, Member of the National Teachers' Association, and President of the Union County Retired Teachers' Association. For 41 years she taught music to people of all ages.

Mrs. Daniel taught piano lessons to an average of 50 students a school year after retirement from teaching in the public schools. She taught piano lessons until the night before she died on October 4, 1978.

These are truly evident of her services to mankind. Throughout her career of service and devotion, she worked quietly and unselfishly. Truly, Mrs. Daniel carved her name on the hearts of many who love and will always remember her.

For the gifts of herself and possessions, the Benjamin E. He spent his entire education career in District Three Schools (1957-1986) and is a resident of the district. Mr. Owens was the first and only typing instructor at Mays, and when it closed, transferred to Pacolet High School. He later taught at Broome High School and retired there in 1986. He is a Life member of the South Carolina Education Association (Retired), and Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. Mr. Owens is especially active in the fraternity's Greenville-Spartanburg Alumni Chapter, working with male students here and in Greenville, Pickens and Oconee counties who want to achieve worthy goals in their communities and in life through education.

He is known as a good neighbor and friend in the Marysville community. Mr. Owens often helps senior citizens by providing transportation to the doctor, drugstore, grocery store or hospital, or by performing other chores of repairs. Mr. Owens also provides tutoring services as well as words of advice for young people.




