A surprise birthday party was given Mr. Charlie Wells by his ten children on his 76th birthday on Sunday, May 6th. All the children and almost all the grandchildren were present for the celebration.

Being an "old timer," Mr. Wells can tell many interesting stories about his early years with Pacolet. In 1892 he helped in the building of No. 3 Mill and remembers that homemade bricks were made near what is now Zion Church and used in the construction. The lime for the mortar was hauled in barrels from a lime kiln at Limestone in Gaffney, he says, and sand was gotten from the river.

Mr. Wells has been working for Pacolet for 60 years except for a period when the mill was being rebuilt. He has been on the same shop payroll for 46 years. Nowadays, his special charge is the carpenter shop and he says he is happier not being retired. The same house he lives in today has been his home for the last 35 years.

Mrs. Wells today is still remembered as being a wonderful mother and homemaker in raising twelve children, keeping them clean and well fed at all times and the home always spic and span. Every child had a task to do and each one had a place for all of his belongings even down to his own clothes hanger.

One thing Mr. Wells tells is true but hard to believe as measured by normal standards. He says that his home still has the same screen doors originally put up 35 years ago, and they resisted the raising of twelve children through the years. The screens aren't made of steel either, he says, but how they lasted so long is almost a miracle it seems.

The New Pacolet Mills Greenhouse



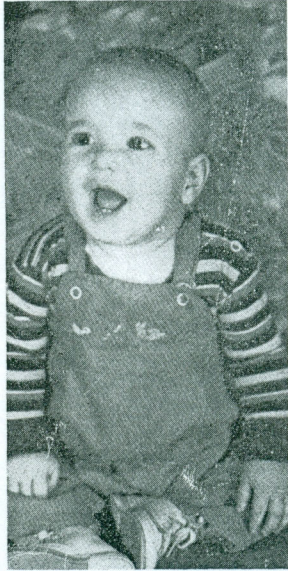

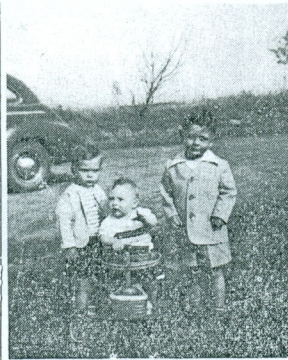

Mrs. Mildred Burgess was honored with a miscellaneous shower at the Girls Club on April 28th.

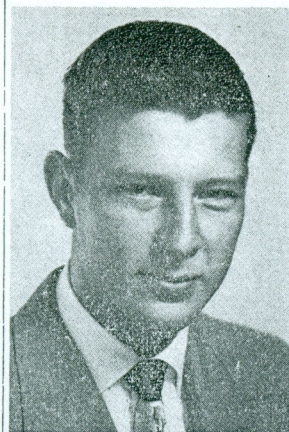
On arriving at the Club, she was
