### A Report to The Town of Pacolet Mills

tunity to make a report to the people of the Town of Pacolet Mills in order to let you know just what has taken place since the Town was incorporated two years ago.

When Pacolet Manufacturing Co. sold the houses to the people, it was necessary to incorporate in order for the town to have someone responsible for the welfare of Community such as; street lights, garbage disposal, water and sewer system, streets and roads, and an adequate fire department.

The Town Council realizing that revenue was necessary to operate the Town, passed ordinances so that revenue could be obtained to pay expenses that would be incurred by the Town. The Town Council carefully considered every step taken, hoping to operate the Town without causing any hardship on citizens.

After studying in detail just what the expense of the Town would be, the Council passed ordinances that seemed necessary. Businesses within the corporate limits were charged a small license fee. A voluntary fee of \$1.00 per month per family was arranged so that garbage could be removed weekly from the homes. The Council then had the Department of Census to make an official census of the Town of Pacolet Mills. This was necessary in order for the Town to receive revenue from beer and wine tax, liquor tax and from motor vehicle registration fees. If this census had not been taken, it would have been impossible for Town to operate on the garbage fee alone.

During the past two years, the Town has spent over \$2,000.00 on the upkeep of the roads in the Mills.

I would like to take this oppor- | community. Even with that amount spent for roads, we realize that an improvement can be made and hope to do so in the future.

> The Town has 66 street lights that cost the Town \$20.00 per year per street light. This totals \$1320.00 a year for the street lights.

> During the past year the Town purchased a new fire truck at a cost of \$12,500.00 and erected a fire department building at a cost of \$4,000.00.

The Town also employed a man in charge of school boys recrea tion during the summer and bought equipment for these boys so that they could participate in sports such as baseball, horseshoes, badmirton and other games.

Your \$1.00 per month has not only paid for removal of your garbage, but has helped in other ways in which the Town Council thought necessary for the betterment of the Community.

The Town is proud of the Volunteer Fire Department. The members have attended school on firefighting and have been instrumental in getting fire insurance rates reduced. If you take out fire insurance on househould furnishings or your home, the rate is \$1.40 per \$1,000.00 cheaper than it was before the Fire Department was organized.

I urge that every citizen cooperate with the Town Council, meet with them at any time and offer your suggestions for any improvement that may be made for the benefit of the Town of Pacolet





The church was organized on October 23, 1871. She has had 20 different pastors during these 76 years. During the past five years the membership has increased from 122 members to 305. There has been 163 by baptism and 73 by letter or otherwise.
